Boniface VIII made it illegal to boil the bones of any man who had died abroad, so during his papacy all corpses had to be carried intact, or in bloody chunks from whatever holy battlefield they met their end.

Anatomists of the day had to make their drawings of skeletons from the burnt or impaled corpses of criminals interred above ground as a warning to their countrymen of what happened to heretics, whores, lunatics, and thieves.

Therefore, all anatomical drawings we have from the 14th to 16th centuries are drawn only from those quietly subversive sources, picked clean by birds disemboweled by wolves.
